Math Makes Sense

We are presently working on our measurement unit. You can help your child at home by doing with them some of the following activities, as suggested in the "Math Makes Sense" teachers' guide:

- Have your child compare and order objects in your home using words such as longest/shortest and heaviest/lightest. Ask your child to explain how he or she compared them.
- Make a weekly calendar with your child. Talk about the family schedule and what happens on each day of the week. Have your child identify the day of the week and the date tomorrow and yesterday.
- Mark a calendar for the current month with your child to show dates of any holidays and special events.
- Make a chart of the months of the year and record the birthdays of family members and friends.
- Choose three objects in your home that you and your child can measure and order by length (for example, kitchen utensils, sports equipment) using units such as paper clips or unsharpened pencils.
- Ask your child to explain why you need to use the same units for each length when ordering length.
- Your child can measure objects and distances in your home using their hand span, arm span, giant steps, or heel-to-toe steps. Encourage your child to estimate before measuring.
- Have children use non-standard units to measure around the wrists and ankles of different family members or friends, and then have them compare and order the measurements.
- Have your child estimate the masses of objects at home. For example, ask: "About how many of these spoons are as heavy as this bowl?"
- Invite your child to practise measuring length, height, distance around, and mass while helping to purchase new clothes or recording their growth.
